### PASTOR'S CORNER

After telling the Parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus asks a man *Who was the neighbor to the man who was hurt by robbers?* And the man replied *The one who showed him mercy*. Then Jesus says *Go and do likewise*. Jesus teaches disciples ancient and modern to put faith into action, to go and do. Disciples are to be merciful, generous, hospitable, growing community and friendship. We could name the many ways that disciples are called to live their faith.

The sermon series this Fall in September and October will be call *Go and Do*. In worship will explore how faith calls people of faith toward action. ### Facilities Update from the Building Manager

Great changes have been taking place around the building and the grounds. Although some of these changes are more noticeable than others, we are making headway and nearing completion of many deferred maintenance issues. Here is a list of accomplishments in 2019:

- 1) First and second floor offices near the rear entrance were effected by a burst pipe have been reconstructed.
- 2) Decades of accumulated and unused items in storage has been removed so that building space is user friendly. This allowed for a dedicated janitorial and custodial supplies room in a central location. A groundskeeping tool and staging area was also created. The maintenance room is now its own same for ease of accessibility for tools.
- 3) Tables and chairs on the lower level are now centrally located for ease of assembly to accommodate church events and outside groups.
- 4) The badly damaged sidewalk has been resurfaced to minimize any potential fall issues.
- 5) Timers and WIFI controls have been installed for garden lights and parking lot lights, as well as interior mechanical operations (circulation fans and HVAC blowers). The sanctuary A/C system is now controlled via WIFI.
- 6) The gym floor material was specially made to keep JAPC historically accurate and then transported by Howard and Sharon Riley. The custom milled wood will preserve the original character of the gym.

- 7) Attic exhaust motors that were non-operational for the last ten or more years are now operational. We have fresh air flowing throughout the building through this system. Bathroom exhaust fans were repaired to exchange air and eliminate odor as they were designed to do. Kitchen exhaust fan is operational and prepared to host large events that require food preparation in our kitchen using our ranges.
- 8) Parking Lot has been resealed and re-striped, thereby minimizing the odds for major repairs.
- 9) The men's bathroom leaks were repaired and urinals lowered for usability for almost all ages.
- 10) Inoperable portions of the boiler have been repaired to put us on the road for a balanced heat distribution and added comfort in the winter months.
- 11) The alley outside the sanctuary where the air conditioning condenser has been landscaped to minimize interference with its operation.
- 12) The window wells around the building have been cleaned so water drainage can run smoothly and prevent leaks.
- 13) Shower partitions have been installed in the open shower room. They were tested by a summer mission group and we now know we can accommodate up to 90 people overnight and every one can have a shower.

The progress will continue to ensure the long life of our history, worship and community space. With the *Facilities Committee*, I will work to preserve and highlight its unique features.

### Summer at JAPC

Summer was a busy time at JAPC as over 30 children came each day for three weeks for a variety of camp experiences. Our partnership with Westminster of Higgins Lake brought some outdoor activities, like setting up a tent, building a campfire, water games, and even a visit from some of God's creatures: snakes, spiders, a toad, and a baby alligator! During the second week, College for Creative Studies led workshops in making a backpack or waistbag, as the campers learned how to use a pattern, design, cut and sew. Drummer Juan Hawkins taught the group some basic music and drumming skills, and he wowed us with his talent. He and the students treated us to a performance on the last day of camp.

The camps could not have been a success without so much support. We had eight volunteer teens (most former campers), adults preparing lunches and providing supervision, and financial support from JAPC camp fund and Wilson grant. Thank you all for a great summer.

### Tutoring T.R.E.E. & Literacy

Tutoring T.R.E.E. kicks off on Tuesday, September 24 from 4-6pm. We are in need of a few new tutors. It is a two hour commitment one day a week. A meeting for tutors will be held on Tuesday, September 10 from 3:30 – 5pm. There are others ways you can support the program too — office help and food service. JAPC is deepening our commitment to literacy by partnering with *SOAR Detroit*. This program is held during the school day at Nichols. The plan is for every 2nd grader (about 30 students) to have a tutor/mentor who meets for 45 minutes twice a week. Volunteers are needed to work with two students, one session each, one day a week in the morning. A training session is provided by *SOAR* and each tutor is given easy to use lessons each week. ### A Return to Missoula

This summer Rose and I had the privilege to return to Missoula, Montana for the International Choral Festival. The Festival occurs every three years and invites choirs from all over the world to participate. My predecessor, Phil Michéal, made it his personal goal to take our choir there and thanks to the generosity of our membership, we were the first church choir to participate in the festival in 2009. The event was so wonderful and memorable that Rose and I made it our goal to return as spectators! Ten years later, we and former choir member Jeff Davis finally made the trip and enjoyed yet another remarkable time in Missoula!

The Festival functions as an exhibition rather than a competition for the choirs, so there is no pressure to shape one's performance to any adjudicator's perceived ideas. All the performances instead are given in a spirit of ambassadorship. The participants this year came from Spain, Lithuania, Hungary, Finland, Germany, Indonesia, China, Estonia and three choirs from the USA. Beyond the novelty of the cultural exchange, the performances from nearly all the choirs was of astoundingly high quality. The Spanish, Lithuanian and Chinese choirs were youth ensembles, but their singers exhibited incredible musicianship. One of the most astounding moments was when the director of the Chinese choir, whose members were all between the ages of seven and twelve, would have the children find their own pitches out of thin air. Clearly they must have spent hours on ear training and developing relative pitch! Regardless of however regimented their rehearsal process must have been, the children performed with incredible joy and flair and great energy!

This time out, since we weren't working to rehearse and perform, we were able to take in the fun atmosphere of Missoula and its surroundings. We stayed in an Air-BnB on the "hip strip" right above a bakery and two blocks from the "Big Dipper," an ice cream shop ranked one of the top-ten ice cream shops in the country according to "Good Morning America." We also had a chance to go on a repeat of the white water rafting adventure we took the first time out and made a visit to the National Bison Range. Prior to the festival, we spent a day on the "Going to the Sun Road" in Glacier National Park.

The beauty of all the vocal sounds and language through the whole festival proved to be both inspiring and healing. This year happened to be an anniversary of diplomatic relations between Indonesia and the Unites States. This led to a collaboration on a pair of pieces between the Indonesian choir and the University of Montana Chamber Choir. This event showed the Festival clearly living up to its purpose in its "dedication to promoting artistic excellence, global understanding, friendship, and goodwill through choral music." Rose and I are eternally grateful to Phil for giving our choir the opportunity to experience this event. We hope our return trip honored his memory. The whole adventure was a great blessing and, in the spirit of this summer's worship theme, a time taken to rebuild and recharge spiritually, personally and professionally.

### Jazz and Concert Series Starts September 29th!

Our *Jazz Series* kicks off this year with Kerry Price soloing on voice and piano on September 29 at 4:30 p.m. On October 27, we will feature a Sinatra Tribute performed by Steve Wood and Kevin Granier. Later in the winter, we will be inviting a return performance of the dueling trombone pair Ron Kischuck and Ed Gouch.

Our *Concert Series* will feature the silent film *Phantom of the Opera* featuring Lon Chaney and accompanied by me on our Skinner Organ. We will also be featuring a group of Oakland University students in an all-Beethoven piano recital as a part of a University series honoring the 250th anniversary of his birth. We will continue the keyboard trend with a concert featuring dueling organ and piano with Nicholas Schmelter and Tyler Kivel. We will also continue the tradition of presenting the Community Chorus of Detroit's Holiday Concert on our series in December. Please look for the dates of these performances as they are announced in September!

# The One-Sided Approach of the Good Samaritan\*

...Now, without a doubt Christian social responsibility includes the sort of thing the good Samiritan did. So we give to the United Appeals, the Red Cross, to all types of unfortunate conditions. In the midst of such staggering and appalling conditions we cannot afford to "pass by on the other side." Like the good Samitan we must always stand ready to decend to the depth of human need. The person who fails to look with compassion upon the thousands of individuals left wounded by life's many roadsides is not only unethical, but ungodly. Every Christian must play the good Samaritan

But there is another aspect of Christian social responsibility which is just as compelling. It seeks to tear down unjust conditions and build anew instead of patching things up. It seeks to clear the Jerico road of its robbers as well as caring for the victims of robbery.
